In Praise of the B Team:

Volunteer Faculty for Orthodontics Receives Award



Perry Opin, DDS, MS, an orthodontist who practices in Milford, and an assistant clinical professor in the Division of Orthodontics, has received the highest award given by the American Association of Orthodontists (AAO), the 2008 James E. Brophy Distinguished Service Award. The award is presented annually to the person who has made significant contributions to the orthodontic specialty in addition to other valuable and devoted services to the AAO and to its membership. Dr. Opin recently received the award at

the AAO's 108th Annual Session in Denver. The AAO is the oldest and largest dental specialty organization in the world with 15,500 members.

Now in his 42nd year as an orthodontist, Dr. Opin devotes part of his practice to assisting children with cleft lip and palate and other craniofacial anomalies and has served on cleft palate team missions to third world countries.

Dr. Opin has been active in organized orthodontics and dentistry. He is a past president of the Connecticut State Society of Orthodontists, the Northeastern Society of Orthodontists (NESO) and the College of Diplomates of the American Board of Orthodontics, among others. He is a past speaker of the AAO House of Delegates and has served as a delegate or alternate delegate to the Houses of Delegates of the American Dental Association, the Connecticut State Dental Association and the AAO, where he has served for the past 29 years.
